Our State theme this year is "Step into Action with AAUW." Opportunities for branches to "Step into Action with AAUW' abound. I realize that a great number of branch boards met in the late spring and early summer to determine programming and set goals for 2015-2016. More times than not, AAUW National does not operate on our time schedule, they set their own and trust that states and branches are flexible enough to incorporate National's initiatives into our state and individual yearly plans.



THE HOUR OF CODE IS COMING AGAIN!



The Hour of Code movement keeps changing the world. It's reached every Apple story worldwide, the White House, 300 partners, and more than 100 million students in 180 countries.

The Hour of Code is a challenge: Try learning to code for just one hour and prove that anybody can learn the basics.

This year can really be a turning point for computer science in our schools - with new tutorials, new prizes, and an ambitious new goal for December 7-13. **Can you get involved?**

Together, we want to reach 100,000 events!

I hope you'll join us to prove anybody can learn, and every young person deserves to learn how to build technology that will and are gearing up for the 2016 November elections.

Not only will Texans be casting their vote for President, there are many legislative seats 'up for grabs' on both the national and state level. The Texas Primaries are held in May, 2016 and will decide on many candidates before the final vote in U.S. and State Representatives run for re-election every two years. There are also many state senate seats that will be decided due to resignations in the Texas Senate. Candidate filings begin on January 28, 2016.

Texans have still not had the opportunity to vote on an amendment to our state constitution addressing comprehensive Equal Pay for Equal Work. The Equal Pay Amendment voted on by both parties in both houses was sent to Gov. Perry in 2013, which he vetoed. Another Equal Pay Amendment was introduced during the 2015 legislative year and did not make it out of the Ways & Means Committee. Results?

The current Texas equal pay measure only states that there shall be no discrimination/retaliation for involvement in legal proceedings; however, this one provision is not far reaching enough and thus the push from state legislature to enact a more far reaching law. There are only four states in the country without any state equal pay laws (AL, MS, SC, UT)

AAUW Public Policy Committee members are asking that AAUW members:

- write their state legislators and those candidates running for state positions to sign a pledge that they will introduce or help introduce and support an Equal Pay for Equal Work Amendment during the 2017 Legislative Session. AAUW Texas Public Policy Committee members will compose this letter and post it on the AAUW Texas website in January, 2016. We need your help in sending these letters to all those running for election in 2016.
- Another way branches may help in the 2015-2016 Impact Grant initiative is to hold an AAUW Action Network Sign-up Drive at a couple of your meetings. Have branch members sign up to become Two Minute Activist and receive AAUW Action Network updates on bills before congress that affect women.
- Voter registration and voter turn-out should ALWAYS be a Public Policy objective. Voter apathy in our country and
