Gilstrap was a professor at East Texas State University/Texas A&M University - Commerce, was a board member of the Hope Center of Greenville and a member of the **AAUW Greenville (TX) Branch**. She also served as director of the Hunt County Head Start Program and was the director of the former West Hill Neighborhood Improvement Association.

Gilstrap served on the Greenville City Council for 12 years and as Mayor Pro Tem for four years. She was the first black woman to run for and hold an elected public office in Hunt County.

She ran as a candidate for mayor in 1988 and missed the runoff election by 13 votes. Gilstrap was also a candidate for District Clerk of Hunt County in November 2004.

This year, some of the big items that are expected to be considered are: various issues affecting public education, minimum wage, sexual assault, human trafficking and more.

AAUW of Texas has a major focus on advocacy this session, and you can be a part of the change you want to see in our state. The easiest way you can make a positive impact this session is to participate in our "communication tree." Our "communication tree," is a tool we use to ignite advocacy on behalf of an issue. To participate in our tree you simply have to let us know! You will be assigned a partner, and that partner will reach out to you when we need your voice on an issue. For example, if we find that the Fair Pay Act is being considered in committee, you will be contacted by your partner and given contact information so that you can advocate on behalf of the issue.

- Tuesday, January 13, 2015 (1st day) 84th Legislature convenes at noon
- Friday, March 13, 2015 (60th day) Deadline for filing bills and join resolutions other than local bills, emergency appropriations, and bills that have been declared an emergency by the governor. We were told after the 60th day is when the real work starts to begin!
- Monday, June 1, 2015 (140th day) Last day of 84th Texas Legislature Regular Session

AAUW of Texas provides NCCWSL Grant & Scholarship Opportunity

AAUW of Texas is excited to announce the establishment of a grant program to aid AAUW of Texas branches in supporting Texas student attendance at AAUW and NASPA's <u>National Conference</u> <u>for College Women Student Leaders</u> (NCCWLS). Early-bird registration, which includes scheduled meals and housing, is \$425. Regular registration is \$475. In partnership with branches, AAUW of Texas plans to provide scholarships of \$550 total (\$275 from the state and \$275 from the branch) to four sponsored students. This amount covers the registration fee and provides some extra money to be used toward transportation costs.

AAUW of Texas will also be offering two direct grants to students attending NCCWSL from state accredited Colleges and Universities. All students must be sophomore or juniors in higher education. Graduating seniors will not be considered by AAUW of Texas.

AAUW collaborates with NASPA—Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education to present this annual leadership conference, which began in 1985. Over the years Texas Colleges and Universities have sent many students to the NCCWSL conferences.

AAUW ANNUAL ART CONTEST



We hear about the gender gap all the time - in salary, in math and science fields, in leadership. But one of the most glaring and longstanding gaps is in the art world. For centuries, women artists were unrecognized, unencouraged, or even discredited simply because they were not men.

Today, things have changed...some. Still, only 5 percent of the art currently displayed in U.S. museums is by women. There remains just one major museum in the world dedicated solely to women artists. That's why, working with the National Museum of Women in the Arts, we host an annual art contest to get women artists the equal attention they deserve. The six winning entries will be featured in a collection of note cards mailed to AAUW members in the spring. And, for the third year in a row, one of the six winners will take home an NMWA Award of Distinction! Enter the 2015 AAUW Art

AAUW of Texas will support the conference by providing the following grants and scholarships. Applications with directions can be found at the following links.

1. Branch NCCWSL Grants

Branches may apply for a \$275 AAUW Texas NCCWSL grant. This grant **must be equally matched by the applying branch** so that the student will receive a state/branch collaborative \$550 NCCWSL scholarship which will cover the \$425 NCCWSL early bird registration fee and allow the student some extra travel money. (The branch is welcome to add additional money to the scholarship if they so choose.)

Four Grants WILL BE AWARDED

2. <u>AAUW TX NCCWSL Grant to the Student from College</u> with the Most REGISTERD E-Student Affiliates

Those students that are enrolled in College/University Texas Partner institutions will be eligible for this scholarship. A student from the College/University Partner school that has the most Estudent AAUW members registered will be awarded a \$500 scholarship.

3. <u>AAUW TX NCCWSL Grant to a Student from Any Texas</u> Institution of higher learning

How to "Celebrate" Equal Pay Day

Sometimes we find ourselves wishing for more than 24 hours in a day or more than seven days in a week, but more time is not always better. It takes AAUW Abilene (TX) Branch opened its activities for the year 2014-15 with an "Ice Cream Social" membership meeting, an opportunity for current members to get back together and to bring others who might want to join the branch. Homemade vanilla ice cream topped with hot fudge, caramel sauce, cherries, nuts and other toppings made it fun while they talked about its branch, "small groups" - Literature, Bridge, and Creative Cooking - which enable members to enjoy each other; upcoming branch meetings and programs, scholarship program which awards scholarships annually to "non-traditional" (mature) women returning to higher education after having education interrupted earlier in life, and the annual "Women of Outstanding Achievement, Women of Promise and Courage" luncheon where they are awarded. Five new members joined the branch, including two of its April 2014 scholarship recipients as student affiliate and graduate student affiliate.

The October meeting included a fashion show by **Christopher Banks**, a raffle for accessory items from that store, and the awarding of two more scholarships.

The branch also visited the <u>World War II 12th Armored Division</u> <u>Memorial Museum</u>. The program began with a guided tour of the museum where the history of the **"Hellcats"** unfolds. At the conclusion of the tour, there was a unique opportunity to "hear today's stories" from women serving in the Air Force stationed at **Dyess Air Force Base**. women about 15 months to earn what men earn in 12, thanks to the gender pay gap.

We "celebrate" this occasion every April on a day known as <u>Equal Pay Day</u>, which is the symbolic day when women's earnings (78 cents to men's dollar) finally catch up to men's earnings from the previous year. Equal Pay Day is a powerful occasion to raise awareness and organize action around the gender pay gap in our communities.

Equal Pay Day 2015 will fall on Tuesday, April 14, so mark your calendar!

For Equal Pay Day 2014, AAUW members organized more than 250 activities in at least 43 states. That's more than twice as many activities than Equal Pay Day 2013 and nine more states!
