Happy 2016 AAUW Texas members! As I mentioned in my article in the Fall November 2015 University Woman Texas, our theme is **Step into Action with AAUW**. From the branch newsletters I receive there is no doubt that you ARE Stepping into Action through your branch activities. AAUW Texas branch members are engaged in AAUW Mission Based events that benefit the women within your communities. Thank you for everything you have done and continue to do for the women of Texas.

One of the Step into Action goals for AAUW Texas has been to reach out to

individual branches and to emphasize '*One AAUW*.' My personal philosophy is Unity and Strength in numbers. That happens as individual members & branches look beyond their own branch activities and make a commitment to the initiatives of AAUW Texas and AAUW National.

Your 2014 - 2016 State Board has made an effort to foster community and relationships between branches and state by:

- Holding Board Meetings in different locations of the state and communicated with Branches, National Members & Action Network members to attend our meetings and our Board Hosted 'Cocktails & Convos'
- **Bringing leadership trainings** in the form of Women Leadership Summits to individual branches and College/University Partners
- Publishing quarterly electronic issues of University Woman Texas. There are over 1,000 email notices sent to members, we use Twitter messages as reminders, Facebook messages and Lone State Loop (another AAUW TX Facebook open forum) as well as post UWT on our AAUW Texas website (<u>aauw-tx.aauw.net</u>)... There are even individual branch members who take it upon themselves to email UWT to their branch members and send hard copies to their members without email or internet service. And yet, members still inform us, they are not receiving their quarterly UWT issue.

 - Do you remember that you signed up to receive an electronic version of UWT and accidentally delete it?

 - <u>Sign up</u> to receive University Woman Texas electronically.

University Woman Texas (UWT) Facts

- UWT issues can be downloaded from the AAUW Texas website. Of the 1,500 plus electronic UWT issues sent out, an average of 450 members at the very least 'open' their copy quarterly. (data from AAUW TX MailChimp account)
- AAUW Texas only mails out one HARD COPY of UWT every two years and that is the Biennial Convention Issue. The 2016 Winter Convention Issue of University Woman Texas will arrive in your mailboxes around March 1, 2016. It will be available online at <u>aauw-tx.aauw.net</u> to view and download. It will also be sent out electronically.
- The majority of AAUW Texas branches and AAUW states use electronic mail to deliver their branch and state newsletters
- Increasing AAUW's visibility in the state and form coalitions with like-minded organization on AAUW issues. Through the application of AAUW Impact Grants in

2014-2015 & 2015-2016, AAUW has begun the necessary steps to advance AAUW Public Policy on various Women & Family issues. We have sponsored **AAUW Equal Pay Lobby Days** at the state capitol in 2014 & 2015 and plans are being are being made for Local Equal Pay Day events the week of April 11-15, 2016. 2016 is also an Election Year and we'll kick off our **2016 Get Out the Vote** (GOTV) campaign with an all-member webinar on January 13. With so much at stake in this election, learn how your branch can register, educate, and turn out millennial women voters nationwide as part of our **It's My Vote: I Will Be Heard** campaign! This webinar will also be available online at <u>www.aauw.org</u> in the upcoming weeks. AAUW is 'networking' with The Coalition for Public School and exploring a relationship with a Statewide Network of Organizations for clean elections and public justice.

AAUW Texas is striving to expand our College/University Partnerships and bring
programs such as Elect Her and Tech Savvy to these campuses as well as enlist
E-student Affiliates and grow Student Affiliate Branches. AAUW Texas also began a
Texas State NCCWSL Scholarship program to assist College/University Partners
AND Branches send students to the annual National Conference of College
Women Student Leaders held in Maryland in early June. (see the article for this



Fran Schroeder, a member of the AAUW San Antonio (TX) branch since 1987, died in 2015. A local scholarship fund was started in her name and a graduate student scholarship will be awarded in her memory in April 2016. Those who fondly remember Fran are invited to add to this fund. Fran was a longtime San Antonio teacher who loved reading. So much so, that for many years she was the facilitator of the Saturday Book Discussion Group. She earned her B.A. at Trinity University and a M.S. at Texas A & M University. A few years before her death she moved to the New York City area to be nearer to her son and his family. Members of the book group remember Christmas meetings at her mid-century home on Town Briar. The holiday décor featured a decorated bare tree branch, reflected in a two-story high window. During her last years in San Antonio the group met several times in the 1920s-era home on Farr Drive that she shared with her daughter Le Green and family. Fran Schroeder will be long remembered and honored as a friend and a voracious reader of interesting books.

At the AAUW Texas 2016 Convention, there will be a vote on proposed bylaw changes submitted by the Bylaws Committee and branches. Click <u>here</u> for a complete copy of the bylaws showing the following: (1) mandatory changes from AAUW national in blue and (2) proposed changes to be voted on in red.

The rationale for the changes are: Article IV. Section 3.a.(4)(c) to clarify that every branch member in the State of Texas must be a member of AAUW Texas; Article IV.Section 5.d. is proposed for deletion since AAUW is no longer affiliated with IFUW; Article V.Section 1.a. is proposed to increase the pool of members available to serve as chair and alternate chair of the nominating committee; and Article XVI. states the current applicable law.

The changes in Article V.Section 2 and Article XIII. are proposed to conform AAUW Texas voting with AAUW national One Member One Vote.

Proposed Change in AAUW Texas State Dues Up for Member Vote

The 2014-2016 State Board members have been reviewing the current state dues structure, plus the AAUW Texas State Goals and benefits offered to branches. As a result, the 2014-2016 State Board recommends that State Dues for Regular Membership (including Paid Life Members) be raised to \$13.00 annually. 

NATIONAL CONFERENCE FOR COLLEGE WOMEN STUDENT LEADERS SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY

Elections at 2016 State Conference Require Recognized Branch Delegates

Each branch must elect an appropriate number of delegates based on its size. Our guidelines for determining the number of delegates that each branch is entitled to have is based on the AAUW Texas Bylaws, Article XIII, Meetings of AAUW Texas:

Section 2. Voting Body or Representation.

a. The voting body of the state convention shall consist of duly elected and vertified delegates, the members of the Board of Directors, all past AAUW Texas presidents, college/university representatives and National members who are members of AAUW Texas.
c. Each branch shall have three votes and, in addition, there may be one vote for every ten members of the Association



above the first ten or major fraction thereof. Each branch shall apportion its votes among the elected delegates.

Student affiliates, in addition to dual members of the branch, count toward the branch membership totals that will be submitted to the State Finance Officer, **Inés García** after February 1, 2016.

The State Finance Officer will soon be sending all branch presidents specific instructions regarding procedures necessary for branches to follow in order to ensure that branch delegates receive the proper credentials at the 2016 State Convention.

Some of the most important and best-paying future careers will be in math and science, fields that are wide open for young women who are prepared. These young women need to take classes in math and science in

middle school and high school so the doors of opportunity will be open to them later.

At this conference participants will meet women successful in math- and science-related fields. They'll discover what they do on their jobs, what education and skills are needed, and how they balance family and career.

Each workshop includes hands-on activities that are fun and help the girls get a feel for the career.

The <u>AAUW Farmers Branch (TX) Branch</u> just celebrated its 25th successful year of hosting **Reach for the Stars**, a 1/2 day career 15-subject workshop for 7th & 8th grade girls to introduce them to careers in math & science. The workshop features hands-on activities for girls and opportunities to meet STEM role models, with a focus on the "growth mindset" promoted in the "Why So Few?" research report.

The event provides a "pay-off" for the school district, according to **Michelle Capener**, Counseling Facilitator of the Carrollton-Farmers Branch ISD, "This unique event has afforded our 7th and 8th grade female students the opportunity to explore STEM career options, to interact with successful female role models, and to view a college campus firsthand. Through their participation in the program, our students have gained valuable insight into potential professions as well as motivation to succeed in their academic pursuits. Our district is sincerely appreciative of the investment made in our students by the American Association of University Women."

A diverse student population from seven area middle schools attends the event. At the workshops girls learn that if they persevere, they can continue to grow and build their skills in STEM. **Mary Lovell**, Presenter Recruiter, enjoys finding diverse workshops for the young women. The veterinarian brings a pet bulldog for examination and a parrot for anatomy instruction. The geologist encourages volcano explosions, and the App Developer helps the participants move from inspiration to reality in creating an app. The young women are active in every workshop, leaving with Mary Kay creams they have made, bracelets from tumbled stones, or components from the tiny robots. The seventh graders tell us they are looking forward to next year and the eighth graders ask why they can't return.

In addition to the middle school counselors and the workshop presenters, the third component for success has been the college site. Besides the obvious compatibility of classrooms and labs, a College-University Partner, **Brookhaven College** has embraced its role in promoting science and math to young girls. Physics professor and AAUW member **Anahita Sidhwa** has handled the site arrangements as they have become more complicated with the greater popularity of the event. Among a dozen other smaller details,

she schedules rooms based on presenter needs, coordinates with the college public information office for design and printing of the program, and contacts the campus police for security coverage. Having a committed on-site employee has helped the branch hold a more seamless event.

Reach for the Stars offers a payoff for the college and the community. Since 1991 over 4,000 students from CFBISD have attended these conferences, and we have records to indicate that about 55% of them came back to Brookhaven College to take credit classes.

The Farmers Branch-Carrolton branch was presented a plaque of appreciation by the Board of Trustees of C-FB ISD for 25 years of coordination of this valuable workshop for young women.

On January 9, 2016 <u>AAUW Northeast Tarrant County (TX) Branch</u> members visited <u>The</u> <u>Gatehouse</u> in Grapevine - a supportive living community where women and children in crisis receive safe refuge, ample time, practical resources and healthy relationships to discover new paths for permanent change. It was developed by a group of friends seeing a need to give other women a hand up with life's challenges, a place to break the cycles of abuse and poverty.

We are excited about an event we are planning for next October for 5th and 6th grade girls in the HEB ISD. **Full STEAM Ahead** will introduce the girls to the STEM and Arts classes available to them in the school district, particularly at the state-of-the-art technology facility, the <u>Gene A. Buinger Career & Technical Education Academy</u>, and will encourage them to include these fields in their school and career plans.

Our branch has been very successful with fundraising this fall and has sent \$2000 to the **Ann Richards American Fellowship** fund and \$1500 to the **AAUW Fund** in addition to supporting our two local scholarships.



On October 20, 2015, the <u>AAUW Plano/Collin County (TX) Branch</u> led a <u>Start Smart</u> workshop at **University of Texas in Dallas (UTD)**. Forty women from various departments attended the event facilitated by branch member **Robin Bellerby**. The women were engaged through interactive activities and a willingness to share their personal thoughts on the wage gap. The branch will be participating in another Start Smart workshop at UTD on March 2, 2016.



Start Smart workshops are specifically designed for college students about to enter the job market. According to AAUW's research, women one year out of college are <u>paid only 82 percent</u> of

what their male counterparts receive. By using the skills taught in this workshop, women are prepared to:

- Negotiate their starting salary and narrow the gap early,
- Improve their lifelong earning potential,
- Articulate their value,
- Build confidence in their negotiation style,
- Sharpen their budgeting skills.
