

Brief History of AAUW Texas

The first branch formed in Texas was the Dallas branch in 1908, under the name The College Club. In 1912, to communicate more effectively with branches, ACA (Association of Collegiate Alumnae) divided the country into sections (now called regions), each with an elected national officer called Regional Vice President. The state of Texas fell within the Southwest Central Section.

The first Southwest Central Regional conference held in 1926 was the final impetus in organizing a Texas state division. At the conference in April 1926, in Hot Springs, Arkansas, Mrs. Jessie Daniel Ames was elected chairman of the temporary organization, and the first convention of the Texas Division was arranged for October 8 and 9, 1926 at the Adolphus Hotel in Dallas. At the time, there were ten charter branches and fewer than six hundred members. The original branches were Amarillo, Austin, Commerce, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Georgetown, Lubbock, San Antonio, and Waco. The San Antonio and Fort Worth branches belonged to the Southern Association of College Women before 1921. At its peak, AAUW Texas had over one hundred branches within the state and a combined membership of almost nine thousand.

AAUW Texas has a rich history of community, state, and international involvement. Successful community projects have marked the history of AAUW TX branches. These include support for cultural activities, monitoring the use of local and state tax revenues, Conferences, Educational Equity Roundtables, Sister-to- Sister Conferences, STEM programs and programs to assist nontraditional students. In recent years, AAUW Texas has publicized and held AAUW's Start Smart and Work Smart programs. The most recent project created by AAUW Texas was the SHARE (Supporting Hardworking Affiliates Rising to Empower) project. This provides an opportunity for branches (affiliates) to receive a grant from the state for a specific project.

Many individual members have received AAUW fellowships and grants that provided financial assistance for publication of children's books, history projects, completion of higher degrees, and change of careers. AAUW Texas members have been individually and collectively involved in activities that have improved their communities and enhanced the status of women.

AAUW Texas has played an active part in the Legal Advocacy Fund since its inception in 1983. Former AAUW TX President Sylvia Newman was the second President of LAF. Several cases involving Texas Universities have been supported by the Fund. Three Texas universities have received Progress in Equity Awards for their efforts to advance equity on their campuses: NETWORKS, Collin County Community College (2000), Southern Methodist University Women's Symposium, The Education of Women for Social and Political Leadership (1996) and the Mary Hufford Hall, Texas Woman's University (1992).

Several AAUW Board of Directors have come from Texas State and our Branches. The state has been visited by members of the AAUW Board of Directors and by a U. S. Speaker of the House.

AAUW TX has historically supported those legislative issues which critically impact the women and children of the state. Major thrusts have included: support of the Texas Equal Rights Amendment (ERA), support of specific acts which positively affect the status of women, endorsement of legislation aimed at improving the status of Texas schools and support of public policy which expands appreciation of the arts, Right to Vote and Equity for all. AAUW TX has been a sponsor of Women's Legislative Days. Recently, AAUW has worked in coalition with a variety of other groups, including the Texas Freedom Network, Coalition for Public Schools, the Texas Women's Health Coalition, and National Association of Social Workers – Texas.

The archives for AAUW Texas are in the Texas Woman's University Library. In 1951, TWU generously provided space and personnel to provide a permanent home for the State historical materials.
